2. Don't expect perfection

Some of the world's most successful people only found success through a great deal of failure. Thomas Edison once said, "I have not failed 10,000 times — I've successfully found 10,000 ways that will not work."

In recent decades, as more and more people around the world have been able to escape poverty, the number of them choosing to enter elementary and secondary education has increased dramatically. In countries which were already economically developed, the average amount of education has also been increasing. In such countries, the biggest change has been a large increase in the number of people entering college. The rationale is clear: after you graduate you have a much better chance of getting a job which is well-paid, satisfying and stable. Ironically, however, the large increase in college graduates has meant that such a justification may no longer be true.

Recent years have seen the emergence of a new phenomenon: "underemployment". Underemployment is not unemployment. Underemployment means that you have a job but that you are over-qualified for it. For college graduates this means they are in jobs which they could have gotten without going to college. Such jobs do not pay as well as jobs which require a college degree. Given that many students paid for college by taking out large loans, this can be a big financial problem.

As the financial risk of college has increased, many potential students are demanding that colleges provide data on the employment rate and starting salaries of their recent graduates. Where colleges do this, it is clear that there is quite a big difference depending on which major you choose. Enrollment in the humanities (subjects such as literature, philosophy, and art) has suffered the most. The most popular undergraduate major in the U.S. is now business.

Some people believe that this focus on starting salaries is a mistake. There are many more types of jobs than there are majors at university, which means that many graduates will end up working in fields that are different from what they studied. Good colleges, at the very least, should prepare a student for multiple jobs throughout his or her lifetime. Colleges need to equip students with the creativity and critical-thinking skills necessary to do the jobs of the future, many of which do not yet have descriptions.
